	1-3		Bn in marshalling area	
	4-5		Serials commenced embarkation and the operation was postponed for 24 hrs.	
	6	(D Day)	Bn assault scale landed between 1145 hrs and 1445 hrs. The move to the assembly area just North of HERMANVILLE SUR MER was carried out without incident. At 1735 the 'R' group moved off to COLLEVILLE SUR ORNE followed by the Bn main body. After about half an hour the Bn moved to ST. AUBIN D'ARQUENAY where the night was spent. Several prisoners were brought in and many papers & documents from enemy dug-outs, etc. were sent back.	
	[7.		At 0830 the Bn moved to PERIERS SUR LE DAN where the attack on CAZELLE was prepared but at 1210 CAZELLE was reported clear of enemy. Led by 'C' Coy the move to the wood just to the North East of LE MESNIL was accomplished. Consolidation was carried out. In the evening some casualties were caused by enemy mortar fire. Patrols were sent out during the night, during which Lieut Cranston's patrol ran up against an enemy heavy tank, inflicting casualties on the crew.	
	8		At 0715 hrs 2/RUR took over R. end of wood and the Bn moved over to L. end where further consolidation was carried out. Enemy continued sporadic mortar fire without further casualties to us.	
	9		In the morning the advance party from the S. Lancs arrive to prepare to take over the position, this being commenced at 1530 hrs. Bn moved to the assembly area near LE MESNIL whilst 2/RUR put in the attack on CAMBES. The Bde Comdr was forward with 2/RUR with whom communication became difficult and the Div. Comdr. placed the Commanding Officer in command of the Bde. On getting news that that RUR had got so far but were pinned down, the Bn put in an attack with two Coys forward. This met with a certain amount of M.G. fire and in the later stages enemy mortar fire which caused some casualties. Following the success of the attack, contact was made with 2/RUR and mopping up & consolidation was carried out immediately.	

10	Further consolidation was carried out. During the day spasmodic M.G.	
	fire and enemy mortar fire occurred. There was also still some enemy	
	snipers active. Capt Roynon-Jones with two O.Rs went out on patrol into	
	enemy lines but failed to return.	
11	Bn area shelled from S.W. Enemy tanks seen in LA BIJUDE area and a	
	small number to 'B' Coys front. Small number of enemy located in A/TK	
	ditch area (0713). 'D' Coy captured a prisoner identified as a Cpl of	
	12 SS Div (Hitler Jugend) & killed two others of a patrol that was near	
	their forward posns.	
12	Patrols were sent out to A/TK ditch area (0173) and towards LA BIJUDE.	
	Bn area was shelled by 88 mm gun in LA BIJUDE area causing casualties.	
	Sniping & sporadic shelling continued at intervals. About 20 tanks	
	including Tigers were spotted at 023733 - these were later shelled by	
	med. arty. Shortly afterwards there was a short severe airburst	
	shelling near Bn HQ, Capt T.D. Sanderson & 5 ORs being wounded and 1 OR	
	killed. Towards midnight tank movement & shouting came from LA BIJUDE	
	area.	
13	Report of heavy enemy guns near LA BIJUDE believed to be shelling	
	beaches. Further movements reported from area of enemy tanks, and a	
	patrol returned after successfully blowing railway lines. Lt Drinkall	
	was wounded. Two fighting patrols were organised but cancelled owing to	
	inability to get arty support.	
14	Patrols sent out. One was fired on by enemy sentry wounding the Sec	
	Comdr but no prisoners were captured. Shells again fell in Bn area from	
	direction of the beaches. 'D' Coy reported landing of paratroops	
	(unidentified). Reinforcements arrived from 'A' Echelon. Occasional	
	shelling, but enemy sniping practically disappeared.	
15	Patrol was sent out to A/TK ditch area (0173), encountered enemy, there	
	was an exchange of fire, several of the enemy believed wounded. Patrol	
	returned safely. 'D' Coy brought in a prisoner, shot at whilst passing	
	in motor-cycle combination. Valuable documents were found & sent to	
	Div. The prisoner's companion was killed.	
16	Enemy intr in 'C' Coy area early in morning. Own arty laid barrage on	
	area forward of 'C' Coy and later a low flying attack was made by enemy	
	plane. Later in evening 2 ORs were wounded by a burst from a Spandau	
	which fired into trees near Bn HQ. Patrols were sent out at night.	
17	Two heavy explosions, probably shells, were heard early in morning,	
± /	followed by more just before first light. Origin unidentified. Area of	
	village church was shelled by enemy about 0540 hrs. Lorry loads of	
	enemy were seen in wood 013731 moving in Southerly direction. 1 O.R.	
	was wounded by enemy sniper. Own Med Arty knocked out enemy mtr posn in	
	LA BIJUDE area after a heavy barrage.

	18	Own mortar shoot at enemy M.G. and mtr posns fell well on target but	
		damage not known. The Pnr officer, Lt Duncan & 1 OR were wounded whilst	
		working on minefield. Patrols were again sent out and the one from LA	
		BIJUDE reported having wounded several enemy.	
	19	Bn prepared to go into Bde reserve and the advance left for LE MESNIL	
		in preparation for the take over. Enemy movement was still reported	
		from posns forward of LA BIJUDE but on small scale. Two ORs were killed	
		and 1 wounded during shelling by enemy.	
	20	The take over from 2/RUR was completed and by 0640 hrs all tracked

		wood (029755). 2 Mx M.G.s began shoot at 1540 hrs. Large force of	
		Allied heavy and med bombers flew over going in direction of CAEN.	
		Lieut Cranston went out on recce patrol to ST CONTEST area.	
	23	Move to take over from 2/LINCS was cancelled. Own arty was active in	APPX. "B"
		morning. Pnr Pl laid a minefield (025747). Lieut Cranston again went on

	1		Enemy shelling at periodic intervals and spasmodic fire from MGs 42. Own artillery was active throughout the day. At night a patrol under Sgt Grant was sent to area of GALMANCHE.	
	2		In the early morning enemy MG fire continued in spasmodic bursts and shelling at intermittent intervals. In the evening about 20 shells fell in and around Bn area causing a few casualties. Sgt Grant's patrol returned with a detailed log of the enemy's activity at GALMANCHE and pinpoints of several mortar and MG posts.	
	3		Just before dawn a short but fierce shelling by enemy occurred round "B" Coy area. Our own artillery continued its activity throughout the day. A patrol from "B" Coy went into the GALMANCHE area at night. Officers from a Bn of S. Staffs visited Bn area.	
	4		Enemy shelled Bn area in the afternoon, followed by spasmodic mortar fire in "B" Coy area causing one casualty. The rain continued in showers and after several days had made ground conditions bad. "C" Coy sent out raid to GALMANCHE. Party A was successful and overran an enemy platoon or section posn. Lieut Raines the officer commanding this party was killed. The party was rallied and brought back very ably by Cpl Cameron. No prisoners taken as enemy ran away but several enemy casualties claimed. Party B ran into what was at first thought to be a minefield, and withdrew. Later it was thought that this was some form of warning device as the explosion on trip wires caused no casualties but MGs all along the GALMANCHE defences opened up.	APPX. "A"
	5		Enemy shelling again at intervals, many unexploded shells reported. Preparations for move. Patrol sent out at night encountered enemy and Capt JT Skinner, MM, was wounded.	
	6		Allied aircraft were seen over CAEN area. Advance party move out in morning to area of BENOUVILLE. Bn HQ area was subjected to severe shelling but no casualties occurred. Patrol was sent out under Lieut Robertson, and succeeded in killing enemy machine gunner, identified as PGR from 12 SS Div. Bn commence moving out to new area towards	APPX "B" APPX "C"

	midnight.	
7	Bn arrived at BENOUVILLE. Four enemy fighters flew over and set fire to an oil dump. Advance party moved off to area LE HOMME (0575) to take over from 2 KSLI, this started late in the evening. A large force of Allied heavy bombers raided CAEN and the dust and smoke covered the area for several miles.	APPX "D"
8	Take over completed in morning. Later the Bn moved forward to rear of LEBISEY and later to high ground forward of village (037710) with rear Bn HQ remaining behind. Patrols reported few enemy forward, but roads blocked with debris.	
9	The attack on CAEN. The plan. The Canadians were to attack from the West. The RUR's in the centre from the North and 1 KOSB from the EAST. The Bn moved off at about 0930 hrs over ring contour "60", which was under shell fire, to FUP on the Eastern outskirts of CAEN. The ghostlike houses slowly came to life as civilians began to realize we were entering the town. They came rushing out with glasses and bottles of wine. As the Bn was forming up on the start line and trying to reestablish wireless contact with companies and Bde, four Boche were seen to withdraw towards the centre of the town. Soon afterwards our HQ was mortared leaving 1 killed and 1 wounded. The Bn then proceeded to clear the town. Little opposition was met. Progress was slowed down by snipers and an occasional MG. Much assistance and information was offered by eager civilians. Debris and cratered streets also made progress extremely difficult. We eventually reached the RV in the Old Town and established contact with the RUR and pushed forward patrols to the river. Patrols met quite heavy fire from across the river and a number of casualties were sustained.	
10	An OP was established overlooking the river. "C" & "D" Coys patrolled forward to the river ORNE and met heavy fire from South bank. Later in the day "B" Coy occupied the Barracks, which had been previously an enemy HQ of some size. Slight enemy shelling during the day.	
11	The Bn left CAEN for rest area with the pipers playing. The advance party left early in the morning for an area round PLUMETOT, the main body moving out later by Companies after handing over to a Canadian Unit.	
12	Rest period commenced. General cleaning up and check of kit. A platoon football game was played and several parties were organised to visit pictures, swimming, etc. Pipe band played Retreat in the evening.	
13	More entertainments were available and in the evening the Bn received the first bread ration since landing. The Div Commander paid a short visit later in the evening. Church Service held near Bn HQ in open air, conducted by Capt WIG Wilson.

14	In the afternoon 2 ME's flew over the area, both were hit by our A/A	
	and one was seen to crash in flames. The Pipe Band played at LUC SUR	
	MER in the Bastille Day Celebrations.	
15	The Commanding Officer held a Bn parade. The advance party left just	
	after midday for area near BREVILLE (1374). The remainder of Bn	
	prepared for the move, and the move commenced just before midnight.	
16	The Bn arrived in new area about 0100 hrs. Remainder of the day spent	
	settling in and digging additional trenches. A few enemy aircraft flew	
	over and were engaged by our A/A.	
17	Preparations for operation GOODWOOD. Several enemy aircraft flew over,	APPX "E"
	but no attack by them in our area.	
18	Bn left for assembly area near LE MESNIL (133727). After waiting there	
	for a short time the move to FUP was commenced. Route - HEROUVILLETTE	
	and mostly cross country, almost due South to position West of	
	TOUFREVILLE. Enemy mortar fire was encountered on route. The Commanding	
	Officer was wounded but carried on in command, and other casualties	
	occurred. The advance to TROARN was commenced and after reaching	
	SANNERVILLE "D" & "B" Companies pushed forward encountering enemy MGs,	
	whilst enemy shelling continued. After an attack by "B" Company the Bn	
	occupied a position in orchard 150678. Consolidation was carried out.	
	The advance and attack were carried out in very hot weather over dusty	
	roads and through villages rendered almost impassable by heavy bombing	
	by the RAF. By darkness it was evident that the enemy snipers had been	
	pushed in and that the Bn was up against a strong def position.	
19	The attack on enemy positions forward of TROARN was continued. "C" Coy	
	were to take Station at 158677 and "A" Coy the X roads 161676. Both	
	attacks were met with heavy cross fire from MG's and though supported	
	by tanks had to withdraw with heavy casualties. Bn resumed former	
	positions and later in day heavy shelling and mortaring caused	
	casualties. The Commanding Officer having been previously wounded, left	
	under orders from Brigadier and Major TG Coverdale took over command of	
	the Bn. Casualties in the Bn during these two days fighting were 12	
	Officers and 140 Other Ranks.	
20	Enemy continued shelling and mortaring during the day. Heavy rain and	
	thunder continued from afternoon onwards making conditions very	
	difficult for everyone. Contact was made with 2 Lincolns after their	
	move to our Right flank.	
21	Heavy rain continued but the men withstood the mud and wet with good	
	spirits. Intermittent shelling continued with occasional mortar fire.	
22	Enemy shelling and mortaring throughout the day at irregular intervals,	
	with a heavier concentration in evening. Own artillery was active in	
	early morning and just before dusk. Patrols sent out to locate forward	
	Carry morning and Just before dust. rations sent out to rocate forward

	23	Own artillery active at first light. About ten shells fell to rear of	
		Bn HQ area from SE direction. Two enemy stretcher bearers approached "A

		it was genuine our stretcher bearers and party went out. One platoon of	
		"D" Company moved forward towards 2 RUR to take up position North of	
		railway line. Enemy shelling continued at intervals. Four deserters	
		from 346 Fus Bn came in through "D" Company lines.	APPX "F"
	24	Movements of enemy tracked vehicles were heard in morning by forward	
		Company. Enemy shelling and mortaring continued at intervals with a	
		heavy concentration in the afternoon. Recce patrols went out in	
		daylight and at night. PW brought in by "C" Company. One shell falling	
		near Bn HQ caused 4 casualties. Reinforcements arrived at night. Most	
		sent to "B" and "C" Companies.	
	25	Another two PW brought in by "C" Company. Both identified as II/192	
		PGR. Enemy shelling and occasional mortar fire continued at intervals.	
		Enemy aircraft were over at night and yellow verey lights were sent up	
		from area of enemy forward positions. Some reinforcements for "S"	
		Company arrived. Recce patrol sent out and established that enemy were	
		active to our left front. Enemy were thought to be digging and wiring,	
		possibly laying mines.	
	26	Recce patrol returned with report of a possible enemy listening post at	
		156679. Enemy shelling and mortaring was more severe than usual,	
		especially between midday and tea time. Lt Col JFM MacDonald arrived to	
		take over command of the Bn.	
	27	In the early hours of the morning enemy aircraft flew above area and	
		dropped flares and bombs in and around the Bn area. Later, towards	
		first light an exchange of small arms fire took place. Lieut Robertson	
		took over the duties of Intelligence Officer. Enemy aircraft again over	
		in the evening after dark, together with slight shelling to rear of	
		area. "D" & "B" Companies sent out patrols.	
	28	Practically no enemy shelling by day. At about 1700 hrs OPs reported	
		two parties of enemy approaching, one to left flank, strength about 5	
		men, and one to right flank, strength about 3 men. Party on left was	
		engaged by LMG fire and ran away. The enemy then opened up with 5cm	
		mortar and LMG fire on our left forward positions, especially that over	
		the road. A vigorous reply was made to this fire first by our own small	
		arms and 2" mortars and later by one battery of artillery. Several	
		enemy casualties were observed and 3 dead bodies seen. A patrol was	
		sent out at night to obtain identifications from these. It could not	
		reach the bodies owing to enemy opposition but retrieved a Spandau	
		which had been left by the enemy in his flight.

29	Enemy shelling at intervals during the day. Bn snipers were sent forward to "B" Company area to observe and pick off enemy in forward positions. Enemy aircraft came over just before dark and dropped a few bombs around Bn area.	
30	Preparations were made for the Bn to move back to CAZELLE area for a rest, the present positions to be taken over by KSLI. This was later cancelled. An OP was established in "D" Company area to report on enemy shelling and mortar fire. Enemy shelling occurred late in the afternoon, but at night no aircraft came over.	
31	The Bn moved to area of BIEVILLE with the Div., going into Army reserve. Companies marched, and the vehicle party leaving in the afternoon arrived about half an hour after the marching troops. During the night some enemy shelling occurred round the area.

France	1		Minden Day. The day was spent settling in at the new area. A party went off to spend the day at 3 Div Club, and the Pipe Band played in the afternoon. In the evening a percentage of the Bn attended an ENSA concert at Bde HQ. A draft of 3 Offrs and 100 ORs chiefly from the Border Regt. arrived. The Bn was standing by to move, but later word came through that this would not take place before the next day.	
	2		The Bn moved by transport to area S.W. of LONGRAYE (7766) and arrived about 2030 hrs. A quiet night was spent.	APPX "A"
	3		The Bn was at short notice to move but late in the evening orders were received to move the following morning. Our own arty were active during the day, and allied aircraft continuously passed over the area.	
	4		Bn moved by TCV to area N of FORET D'EVEQUE (644511) and remained at short notice to move. This area was quiet with no enemy shelling or bombing.	APPX "B"
	5		No enemy activity in area. Reinforcements (21 ORs) arrived in the afternoon. Recce party left and preparations for capture of MONTISANGER were made.	
	6		Bn moved out in TCVs at 0500 hrs and arrived at assembly area 672379 at 0700 hrs. The 'O' Group moved to S.L. at 0815 and the attack with "C" Coy on left and "D" Coy on right commenced at 0845 hrs. By 0955 hrs MONTISANGER was occupied without opposition. Patrols were sent out to the main road and river S of PISSOT. Two bridges (675340 - 666340) reported blown. An attack on positions S of the river (sqs 6734, 6735) was ordered at 1700 hrs to start at 1800 hrs. This attack was carried out with "C" Coy on the right and "A" Coy on the left. The two coys reached their first objective and pushed on but were pinned down by enemy MG fire from flanks when approaching the railway (sq 6737). These two coys made this adv against fairly heavy opposition, almost completely unsupported. Owing to the blowing of the br (675340) and the speed with which the attack had to be prepared, it was not possible to get any sp arms to them except one tp of tanks which got over later in	

,	1		
		the evening, and, by a very gallant attack, saved the situation on "C"	
		Coy front. One complete pl of "A" Coy is missing from this operation	
		and many offrs and ORs of both coys were killed and wounded. Late that	
		night orders were received from Bde that the Bn was to consolidate - if	
		necessary withdrawing. The withdrawal of the two fwd coys was carried	
		out and by first light the Bn was in position astride the bridge at	
		675340.	
	7	Patrols were sent out and reported enemy still occupying position of	
		previous day. Enemy shelling and mortaring of Bn area occurred at	
		midday. A later patrol reported no enemy in wood 684335. Further	
		shelling and mortar fire occurred later in the day. One casualty.	
		Bn left for conc area after advance party from the Suffolk Regt	
		arrived, and the take over was done Coy by Coy.	
	8	Bn HQ was established in LA GROUDIERE 663342 with Coys in a fairly	
		small area. Apart from a short shelling in the early evening a quiet	
		day was spent. The Bn moved out to assembly area at 2130 hrs. 2	
		Lincolns moved in to take over. By midnight Bn HQ was established at LA	
		PLANCHE (648338).	
	9	With 2 RUR on our left a two Bn attack on main road from VIRE was	
		commenced at 0600 hrs. By 0755 all Coys had taken their objectives and	
		shortly after the Bn consolidated in area just W of YAUDRY (655316). A	
		patrol by "B" Coy captured four enemy, identified as belonging to a	
		motorised Pnr Bn on special service. Two patrols sent out. The first	
		was fired on when approaching ROULLOURS and MG fire and mortar	
		increased as it neared the village. The MG fire was located in area of	
		pt 262 (673303). The second patrol reported enemy in LA BOIVINIERE	
		6531, possibly a tank or SP gun. A later patrol reported the above	
		village deserted and pin pointed SP gun at 656309. A further patrol was	
	1.0	sent out to knock out the SP gun. This patrol failed to find the gun.	
	10	Early in the morning enemy shelling just outside area occurred at	
		intervals for about an hour and a half. Towards midday splinters from	
		two rounds fired by an enemy S.P. set fire to the farm building at Bn	
		HQ. This blazed rapidly and was soon completely burnt out. Practically	
		no kit or equipment was lost. Slight enemy shelling continued at	
		intervals. At 1700 hrs two patrols were sent out each pl strength,	
		under arty and mortar covering fire. The first reported the orchard at	
		LE FAY 657307 clear of enemy. The second patrol came under heavy mortar

24-	The Bn Intelligence Section under the IO left to carry out a search for	
27	destroyed enemy equipment in an area round FALAISE. The Bn remained in	
	the same position and carried out Coy and Pl training under Coy	
	arrangements. Training with tanks was also carried out. The 4th Gren	
	Gds co-operating. Bn Church Parade was held on Sunday followed by a

Our 3" mortars then fired 50 rounds on area of the rly at 799325. Then Q3 followed by the Southern half of 943 DF task by 33 Fd Regt. At 0620 C Coy heard enemy movement on the East of rly and asked for Q3 and Q1. The 33 Fd Regt obliged us promptly. C Coy reported that they had heard moaning coming from the area where they had shot up the enemy patrol. A short time afterwards C Coy fired on two of the enemy seen dragging a third with them. Shortly after mid-day A Coy reported hearing movement of heavy tracked vehicles at 800322. As we had been told to expect a counter attack, this sounded ominous. We stonked the spot heavily however and the movement ceased. At 1630 A Coy standing patrol reported one explosion 200 yards to the East of the level crossing at 799320. There was no report as of a gun so we concluded that it was a demolition. At 1845 a rapid stonk was put down on HOEVE VICTOR. Several sentries reported having seen a machine like a glider going from North to South across our front at about 1930 hrs. D Coy standing patrol during daylight reported occasional signs of enemy movement, however there was nothing new of importance. D Coy recce patrol under Sgt Batey were fired on by five of the enemy in the South East corner of orchard forward of D Coy.	
	2		During the earlier part of the morning there was very occasional spandau fire up the rly from the South. Otherwise everything was exceptionally quiet. During the day A and D standing patrols saw and heard nothing unusual, just the occasional enemy vehicle moving S.E. of SMAKT and voices in SMAKT itself. 22	Recce for Coy and Pl Comds of area South of VEULEN for the attack.	
	Preparations made for the attack in which 2 LINCS were also to	
	participate, pushing forward due East of their posns in VEULEN	
	supported by Churchill tanks. During the hours of darkness the VEULEN	
	area was heavily shelled by enemy guns, some of them firing from a	
	considerable distance away. Patrols of 2 LINCS reported enemy still in	
	posn up till 2000 hrs, but at 2400 hrs reported no sign of enemy.	
23	At 0300 hrs the Bn marching personnel started moving from the WEVERSLO	
	area to the assembly area just to the West of VEULEN, arriving at about	
	0415 hrs. The Bn was formed up in the order B Coy, A Coy, D Coy with	
	Tac Bn HQ and one sec of Pnrs in the rear. At 0445 hrs this party moved	
	due South along a taped route to the Start Line, which was also taped,

	reported clear at 0945 hrs then moved by tracks to the wood at 850233.
	At about 840231 a civilian approached a stretcher bearer, Pte Cope, and

	end of the day had taken SWOLGEN 8722. Lt AM Young started an NCO's
	Cadre. Programme will be found under Appendix B. Today was spent in
	cleaning up and making billets more comfortable.
26	Quiet day. Training as for 25th. At about 1000 hrs two bombs were
	dropped in our area. Otherwise there was nothing of interest.
27	Another quiet day except for a great deal of traffic on the VENRAIJ -
	VENLO road. In the evening at 2000 hrs an officers dinner was held in
	celebration of St. Andrews Day on the 30th.
28	The CO recced the GEIJSTEREN, OOSTRUM, OORLOO and VENRAIJ areas, which
	were to be in our next Bn area. The KASTEEL at 834299 was still
	occupied by the enemy and there was a small enemy pocket between

	WANSSUM 852279 and HELLING 853269, which showed no signs of wanting to give in. The RUR moved into BLITTERSWIJK 8727 - WASSUM 8527 - MEGELSOM 8625.	
29	The 2nd-in-Comd and Coy Comds recced the new Bn area. In the late afternoon B Coy moved into WANSSUM on the West of the MOLENBEEK relieving a Coy of 1st Norfolks, to assist the RUR in clearing the WANSSUM - HELLING pocket. The remainder of the Bn received orders to move the next day.	
30	The Bn moved at 1000 hrs to the new area except for B Coy which remained in WANSSUM. The move was completed by 1500 hrs and locations were as follows: - Bn HQ 808274, A Coy ZANDHOEK 814249, D Coy OOSTRUM 808271, S Coy OORLOO 821250. During the previous night the Suffolks had assaulted the KASTEEL at 834299 but had found it clear of enemy. During the afternoon one Coy of the RUR failed to clear the WANSSUM - HELLING pocket from the South. At 2200 hrs the pocket was stonked by 2" and 3" mortars. 	1		At 0100 hrs the WANSSUM - HELLING pocket was again stonked and the RUR again tried to assault from the South, but again they were heavily shelled and mortared and held up by MG fire. At 2130 hrs orders were given for the move the next day to the TIENRAY area (8523), in preparation for an attack with the RUR and a Bn of Churchill Tanks on the WANSSUM - HELLING pocket.	
	2		Recce and orders all morning for Coy and Pl Comds. The Bn were all settled in the TIENRAY area by 1430 hrs. At 1400 hrs a message was received to the effect that during the morning the Carrier Pl were ordered to send a patrol across the MOLENBEEK to the Eastern half of WANSSUM, as civilian reports indicated that the enemy had cleared out the night before. The patrol found the place empty, so the RUR sent a Coy to occupy it. Arrangements were made for B Coy to take over GEIJSTEREN 8529 and the KASTEEL area the next day. Major CG Stonor, Lieut HA Richardson and Lieut GA Duncan and 50 ORs returned to the Bn after being wounded and in hospital in England.	
	3		Quiet night. At 0900 hrs B Coy Comd and Pl Comds went to the GEIJSTEREN area to recce their new positions in that area. At 1100 hrs B Coy moved off to the GEIJSTEREN area and by 1400 hrs the take over was complete. An OP party from B Coy had relieved a Pl of 2 Lincolns in the KASTEEL before first light, however, by last light they had nothing to report. During the hours of darkness Capt Sturgeon and 1 OR of 2 RUR were removed from a house in WANSSUM by an enemy patrol. It is presumed that they are prisoners.

	1		The enemy celebrated the New Year by firing rifles and automatic weapons into the air. We stonked him which rather damped his enthusiasm. A good deal of movement was seen on the front during the day, mostly in 9015 area. The area of LOMM 9117 was also active though not to such a great extent. Visibility was good and a fair amount of detail was observed. Obstacles were observed on both sides of the river in the form of wire fences on the edge of the water from 901166 to 903174. This obstacle was at first thought to be continuous, but on a second examination this was found to be incorrect. Patrols had nothing of particular interest to report. Brigadier GD Renny, who was CO of the Bn from April to the end of July 1944, when he was wounded has taken over Command of 9th Brit Inf Bde.	
	2		A clear cold day with fair visibility. A fair amount of movement was seen in areas 9016, 9116, 9117. Movement around LOMM was especially noticeable. One or two heavy shells fall in the Bn area shortly after 1900 hrs but otherwise there was nothing of particular interest during daylight. Patrols reported suitable launching site at 90301475 but the banks on both sides were very exposed. At 2230 hrs a horse and cart were heard in area 905147, and at 0230 in the same place the noise of hammering stakes was heard. Renny came to say goodbye to the Bn before going to take over 156 Bde in 52nd Division. Brigadier J.S. Kempster came as our Brigadier.	
	2		During the morning preparations were made for the move in our role as L of C protection for 30 Corps. At 1400 hrs advance parties left for GROENLO in HOLLAND. The Bn left with the Bde convoy at 2100 hrs arriving some two hours later. The Bn task was to protect the exits from GROENLO to the NORTH which was done with three companies forward and one company in reserve. It was a peaceful though damp night.	
	3		A quiet morning. At 1200 hrs advance parties left for ENSCHEDE, where we took over the NORTHERN exits of the town, with the 2 RUR on the Right. The Bn arrived shortly after 1800 hrs and was settled in by last light in the positions left by 2 R. WARWICK Regt. A quiet and peaceful night.
